With the livestreaming of Morning and Evening Prayer, there is a Mobile Phone app available for download called "Epray". It is free and has the service and readings all in one neat package. If you would like to join us for these services, I encourage you to download this particular app. For i-phones it is from the app store and for android devices, from the Google Play Store.

This week has been a quieter week – with some time to begin catching up on the paperwork and emails.

Claire Bell and I started a Grief Awareness Course called "Seasons of Grief" at the Community Centre in Woodberry back in March. It was to go for 4 weeks and we were only able to attend 2 sessions when Lockdown occurred. We have been contacted by the co-ordinator of the course and it is to re-start at the end of this month – in a bigger room that allows for appropriate social-distancing. We are looking at starting a Grief Support Group for those who may be interested later in the year.

Under the heading "**The Compassion of GOD**", I was directed to Psalm 71:6 – "By You I have been upheld from birth, You are He who took me out of my mother's womb."

We have the theology for prosperity down pat, but sooner or later our prosperity will give way to adversity. If we don't have our theology fine-tuned for that part of our lives, we won't do well. Unexpected, unannounced, uncharted, unplanned – adversity comes to everyone.

Every believer should be able to review the compassion of GOD. Stop and think about all the paths GOD has led us down like a shepherd throughout our spiritual lives. GOD has been faithful to us! Is there any reason we have to doubt His faithfulness now? As the psalmist says, from our mother's womb GOD took us, and He has upheld us from our birth.

Even if we have been a believer for only a matter of days or weeks, the grace of GOD has brought us life and health and strength. GOD's past faithfulness and compassion toward us is a heritage upon which we build our faith in the future.

We are looking to re-open our Parish Pantry ministry on Monday mornings. As Heather Buckingham has advised us in last week's Pew Sheet:

"We have been given permission by the Diocese to reopen our Parish Pantry with the following conditions in place. 1. We must follow all Social Distancing (and personal hygiene) Requirements. 2. Any volunteers who are over 70 years of age or have underlying Medical Conditions are required by NSW Health to collect a form from St. John's and obtain Medical Clearance from their G.P. If this causes any difficulties, please talk to Fr. Steve or Heather Buckingham. Until this happens, we unfortunately cannot reopen Parish Pantry and resume our Emergency Food Programme."

There are some of our volunteers who are unable to continue for the moment with Parish Pantry. If you have never been a part of the Pantry ministry, would you pray about it and consider it please? It is an important ministry of our parish in its connections with the wider Raymond Terrace community.

Like everything in a "COVID-19 world" there is usually a form to be filled out – partly a cynical response but overall a true statement. This one is called "Anglican Diocese of Newcastle **Health and Medical Declaration Form – Volunteer Role During COVID-19**." It is our responsibility as Church to maintain a safe environment and this is a part of this responsibility.

We are beginning to receive enquiries concerning baptisms. We are due to have our first one in 2 Sundays time and another two in the second half of August. The biggest challenge for the families is to keep the maximum number of guests within the social distancing rules.
