Welcome to our latest weekly newsletter.

I am thankful to Heather Buckingham and Tracie Hendriks for the flowers and the intercessions respectively for Mass on Sunday. Services have resumed in St John's and this week will be as follows:

Holy Communion

- Saturday at 6pm 20 June 2020
- Sunday at 9am 21 June 2020 livestreamed
- Wednesday at 9am **24 June 2020**
- Morning Prayer livestreamed daily at 8am Tuesday to Saturday
- Evening Prayer livestreamed daily at 5pm Tuesday to Saturday

I repeat the information in last week's newsletter so that we can all allow it to "sink-in" to our understandings. Under the new COVID19 regulations, we all need to register to come to Church. What does this mean?

When you walk up the driveway, go first to the morning-tea area to have your name and telephone number recorded. You will then be informed of the area of the church in which you'll be sitting – because of the social distancing regulations in place. For those who are included in our Parish Directory, we will have a list with your name and phone number on it. Each week we will simply "mark the roll". Each week we have to send this list to the Diocese so that, in the rare event of somebody having COVID19 at one of our services, everybody who attended can be contacted and appropriate medical care can be administered. The areas of the Church used for any service need to be cleaned thoroughly each time using new cleaning protocols issued by the NSW State Department of Health. Communion will continue to be of one kind – bread – only. Things are different. There are marks on the floor, posters on noticeboards telling us about conditions of entry into the Church, how to wash our hands, how to stay 1.5 metres apart, and what to do when we cough or sneeze. AT ANY ONE TIME, UNDER CURRENT RULES, THERE CAN BE ONLY A MAXIMUM OF 50 PEOPLE INSIDE THE BUILDING. This regulation is one to which we must strictly adhere.

Under the heading "**The Job of Thanksgiving**", I was directed to the Old Testament book of 1Chronicles, chapter 16:41 - ⁴¹With them were Heman and Jeduthun, and the rest of those chosen and expressly named to **render thanks to the LORD**, for his steadfast love endures for ever.

Perhaps you've never heard of these two men – they're among the Bible's most obscure characters. Yet their role was paramount. In the great worship choirs of King David, they were appointed to give thanks. Jeduthun and Heman "were under the authority of the king," says 1Chronicles 25:6. And they were designated by name to give thanks. It was their job.!

Giving thanks is our job too. We're under the authority of a king who commands: "Be thankful" ... "Offer to GOD thanksgiving" ... "Come before His presence with thanksgiving" ... "Enter into His gates with thanksgiving" ... "In everything give thanks; for this is the will of GOD in CHRIST JESUS for you" (Colossians 3:15; Psalm 50:14; 95:2; 100:4; 1Thessalonians 5:18, respectively).

This is one of GOD's commands for healthy living. The Creator of the soul is the Master Psychologist. He knows that thanksgiving is not only appropriate but therapeutic. It's hard to be both thankful and, at the same time, grumpy, cantankerous, critical, or ill-tempered,

Be a Heman. Be a Jeduthun. We are appointed by the King to praise His name and to thank Him every day. [David Jeremiah - Morning and Evening Devotions - Thomas Nelson Publishers]

Something you might consider is a **Gratitude Journal**. I have been using one since the middle of May. All I do each day is to record **THREE** things for which I am thankful. You can always record more but 3 is the suggestion. By doing this exercise each day, we build up within ourselves an "attitude of gratitude". I encourage you to give it a go.

Under the heading of "The Beauty of the Mercy Seat" the bible in the Song of Songs tells us "The king made this mercy seat for Himself out of the finest wood that will not decay." Song of Songs 3:9
