On Tuesday I was able to have a communion service at Opal Aged Care. Joyce Wood reminded me that she turns 102 next week (16<sup>th</sup>) – so many birthday blessings, Joyce. Jeanne Mullaney, Peggy Davies and Edith Hostler were also at the service – along with Ted and Mick.

Bishop Peter has called a meeting of Clergy on Wednesday 25 November at the NEX Club in Newcastle – the old Newcastle Workers Club Site – to talk about:

- Our life together following the decision of the Appellate Tribunal
- Sustaining parish ministry following the conclusion of Jobkeeper
- The administration of wine as part of communion services
- Other matters

In the same letter, he also informed us that in 2021 there would be 2 sessions of Diocesan Synod – again at the same venue. The first session – postponed due to COVID – will be on 5 and 6 March 2021 and the second session on 29 and 30 October 2021.

I would like to hold a Parish Meeting to discuss how we will move into the future and to talk about the updated COVID-19 requirements. I will be holding this on Sunday 22 November 2020 at 10:30am following the 9am service. This meeting should be over within an hour.

Bishop Peter has issued an invitation to people in the Diocese to make submissions in relation to the administration of Holy Communion. Given the ongoing nature of the Global COVID pandemic, it is his intention, prior to Advent, to release some revised guidance about the administration of the Holy Communion in the Diocese. He is reviewing the way we might resume the administration of wine in the service of Holy Communion either with intinction of the bread in the wine or the use of individual cups or both. There have been studies overseas and within Australia concerning this which will guide Bishop Peter in his decision-making process. Watch this space!

In other news, the vacancy at Gloucester Parish due to the Reverend Rob Llewellyn becoming the Dean of Darwin Cathedral is to be filled by the Reverend James Brooks, currently an assistant priest in the Parish of Forster-Tuncurry.

Under the heading "**Freedom to Love**", I was directed to Romans 13:10 – "Love does no harm to a neighbour; therefore, love is the fulfilment of the law."

The famous 19<sup>th</sup> century preacher Charles H Spurgeon was fond of smoking cigars. Because this was before the days of research into the effects of tobacco, he saw nothing wrong with the practice. Until, that is, he passed a tobacco shop with a sign advertising a particular cigar for sale: "The cigar smoked by C.H. Spurgeon." That was the last day Spurgeon ever smoked a cigar. Charles Spurgeon recognised that something he had a right to engage in might be viewed as a vice by other believers. He didn't want his actions to be a stumbling block for others. In other words, his love for people was greater than his love for cigars. Spurgeon learned this spiritual lesson in love from the apostle Paul, who counselled first-century Christians to be self-sacrificing in their love for one another. While "all things are lawful," he wrote, "all things are not helpful" (1 Corinthians 6:12). Freedom in CHRIST does not mean we have the right to do anything we want. Rather, it means we have the power to do everything we ought. If there is any right we love more than a brother's or sister's progress toward holiness, it is a right that is best left unexercised.
