Bishop Peter has called a meeting of Clergy on Wednesday 25 November at the NEX Club in Newcastle – the old Newcastle Workers Club Site – to talk about:

- Our life together following the decision of the Appellate Tribunal
- Sustaining parish ministry following the conclusion of Jobkeeper
- The administration of wine as part of communion services
- Other matters

This Sunday – 22 November – we will be holding a Parish Meeting to discuss how we will move into the future and to talk about the updated COVID-19 requirements. It will be at 10:30am following the 9am service. My thoughts concerning the logistics of this meeting were that at end of Mass, we could stretch our legs and then return to wherever we were sitting in Church – by 10:30am – so as to avoid unnecessary COVID cleaning following our meeting. All the electronics – screens, computers etc – will be in place and won't need to be re-arranged. This meeting should be over within an hour.

I am encouraged by recent public announcements by our Premier concerning the easing of restrictions. At the time of writing this newsletter, our Bishop had not written to us concerning our response to these measures. We had received an invitation from Raymond Terrace Bowling Club concerning participation in the Lighting of the Christmas lights in the Old Rectory grounds. At a meeting of Parish Council, it was decided that: "The parish regretfully withdraws from participating in the Lighting of the Christmas tree, carols and stall this year. We have made our decision in line with Diocesan and Department of Health guidelines regarding safe COVID19 practices."

Also, from Parish Council, the Kinship Carers group is meeting again at the church. A former member has re-joined the group plus a new member. The number permitted to meet in the hall is to be determined in line with COVID physical distancing.

Our Parish response to our usual giving of Christmas hampers has also been affected by COVID restrictions and requirements. The neighbourhood Centre has, in the past, had input into the Parish's decision to modify the usual Christmas hampers for needy families. They are supportive of a more COVID safe initiative – gift vouchers plus a small gift of Christmas items. There will be approximately 20 families receiving the modified hampers and this can be funded through revenue not used during the COVID crisis - some \$3000.

Under the heading "Your Neighbour Needs You", I was directed to Leviticus 19:18 – "You should not take vengeance ... but you shall love your neighbour as yourself."

During the American Revolution, a man named Michael Wittman was sentenced to die for treason. A pastor who had been the object of Wittman's hatred walked 70 miles to plead with General George Washington for Wittman's life. Washington refused until he discovered Wittman was the pastor's enemy, not his friend. Because the pastor had shown such love for an enemy, Wittman was released and became the pastor's fast friend.

One of JESUS' best-known parables was about 2 religious men – a priest and a Levite – who failed to show mercy and love to a dying man. Only when an enemy of the man, a Samaritan, came along was love revealed and the man saved (Luke 10:30-37). As CHRIST loved us, so we are to love others (1 John 4:11). The Good Samaritan changed his world with love. Is there a neighbour in our world whose life could be changed by our love? Who is our neighbour?
