It was good having refreshments after our Sunday 9am service. There is a fact sheet — **Fact Sheet COVID safe Preparation of Refreshments** — which gives us all the health regulations to follow.

The area that is used for the service of refreshments must be set up in accordance with the **Fact Sheet: Preparing the Church Building** - available for perusing at Church.

There has been some discussion as to the rules we need to follow at Church that don't seem to be followed in other areas of our community. The rules we are following are those from the NSW Department of Health and are important for the age-group of our congregations. As you are aware, mask wearing is not mandatory; but is **STRONGLY ENCOURAGED** because we take, as a Church, the health, safety and well-being of all who attend, seriously

If you have a smartphone – whether an ANDROID or I-Phone, I encourage you to download the "**Service NSW app** onto that phone please. We began using the QR-code last weekend and at the Baptism of the 2 girls last Sunday morning. Less people were able to attend than were originally planned. The total number of people at the baptism came below the COVID capacity of St John's and so, thankfully because there was a strong wind blowing last Sunday, we were able to baptise the two girls – Faith and Alana – inside. It was a much more comfortable event for everyone.

For those who were able to attend, there was a morning tea at the Old Rectory for members of our Bible Study groups last Wednesday. It was wonderful to get together socially on what was a nice day.

It was decided at our recent Parish Meeting that from the first Sunday in February 2021 that we would return to 2 services on a Sunday – 8am and 10am.

Under the heading "**The Gift of Prayer**", I was directed to Psalm 103:17 – "But the mercy of the LORD is from everlasting to everlasting on those who fear Him, and His righteousness to children's children."

A classic Christmas poem says "Over the river and through the woods, to Grandmother's house we go. The horse knows the way to carry the sleigh through the white and drifted snow." These words convey the joy of grandparents and grandchildren spending time together. But what if the grandchildren aren't available? Many grandparents can't be with their grandchildren as often as they would like. If this is you, why not give your grandchildren a special gift of prayer? Devote extra time every day to praying for your dear ones by name. Search the Scriptures for verses to pray into their lives. When Christmas Eve or Christmas Day arrives, set aside a "sweet time of prayer" on their behalf. One of the things grandparents can do better than anyone else is to pray for their grandchildren. How many of us had grandparents who were prayer warriors? Who can tell how much our lives were shaped and protected by their strong and ceaseless intercession?
